Inger Sward Johnson, Barry Stratton's maternal great grandmother, was born in 1848 in Sweden to Elna and August Sward. (August's birthname was Ake Akesson. His name was changed after he served in the Swedish army and received a new name as an honor. Sward means Sword in Swedish).

She spent an idyllic childhood "playing in the lush meadows and clear streams by the rolling green hills where wild flowers grew in profusion". Around 1856, the Mormon Elders came to visit the family. Some family members converted at that time, but Inger, wanting to be sure she was doing the right thing, waited until she was 17 before being baptized. Inger and her older brother, Andrew, being the oldest in the family, were the ones first chosen to go to "Zion." They earned enough money to pay for the Atlantic passage on the sailing vessel, "The Emerald Isle"

The crossing took 9 weeks and Inger was very sick most of the time. The boat captain "considered us little better than cattle and that is the way we were treated." The next part of the journey was by passenger train. In Omaha they changed to a train with cattle cars where they had their own bedding and food. Whenever the train would stop, they would jump off and start a fire to cook their food and then hop back on with the hot pan and half-cooked food. At the end of the rail line, they were met by a wagon train composed of ox teams pulling covered wagons. Each wagon had a teamster who had been called to drive the saints to Zion. The wagon next to them was driven by a young man named John Johnson. (She later married this handsome young teamster!)

Inger was lonesome for Sweden and her mother, and found the prairie land barren and gray. Upon arriving in Utah she had expected a paradise and instead found a thinly populated desert. She stated "if it had not been for the Atlantic Ocean, I would have put my possessions in a red handkerchief and walked back to Sweden." The two siblings went to Utah Valley to begin life. Inger found a job as a housemaid and had very patient employers who taught her English and how to make clothes. Inger and her brother Andrew worked hard to earn money for passage to America for the rest of the family in Sweden.

Soon, Inger was being courted by John Johnson and "I finally said yes to his proposal of marriage". They rode a muledrawn wagon to Salt Lake City where they were married in the Endowment House. On the way, they were stranded in the Pleasant Grove area when, after stopping to water the team and rest, the mules made a break for home, running off with the wagon. Several farmers helped them

catch the mules.

The young couple lived in a log cabin in Lake View on the north shore of the Provo River. John earned a meager living by fishing for Peter Madsen. In 1873, the rest of the family from Sweden was on their way to Zion. "I was trying to think of a gift I could have for mother when she arrived, but I had no money. Finally I had a plan and I sold my hair, my long, wavy, black hair, for \$1.00. With the money, I bought enough calico for a dress and had it ready when she arrived."

Four children were born in this home. Finally they saved enough money to buy 10 acres of farmland in Lake View. John made bricks from the clay he found near the lake and they were very happy to get settled in it. Four more children were born in that home.

In 1889, Inger's husband, John, was called on a mission to Norway. The older girls shouldered the farm work and became quite skilled at handling a team of horses, chopping wood and milking. Inger studied English and wrote all her letters to John in English. When John completed his mission and returned home he was called as a Bishop in Lakeview.

In 1915, Inger and John retired from the farm and moved to Provo. She loved to bake Swedish biscuits flavored with cardamom. Inger died in 1928 at the age of 80. Her youngest son, August, was Barry Stratton's grandfather.
